Neil H. Parker, M.D. (RES '75, FEL '78), senior associate dean, Student Affairs (1995-2014) and Graduate Medical Education (1985-2014) and Admissions Committee chair (1995-2014) has been named the Medical Alumni Association Alumnus of the Year for 2014. Dr. Parker has been a member of 40 David Geffen School of Medicine at UCLA committees. Over the past two decades, he has served on 10 UC systemwide committees and task forces, including the Graduate Medical Education Committee and Universitywide Health Planning Committee, where he served as chair for a decade. He has dedicated his career to enhancing the education of UCLA medical students, residents and postdoctoral fellows. More than 15,000 of UCLA's medical alumni have benefitted from his rare blend of compassion, humor, passion and intelligence.
